SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF A CONTRACT AMENDMENT FOR GORBET + BANERJEE, PUBLIC ART INFRASTRUCTURE DESIGN TEAM FOR MINETA SAN JOSE INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT PUBLIC ART PROJECT.

REASON FOR SUPPLEMENTAL OR REPLACEMENT

This supplements the memorandum recommending that the City of San Jose amend the design agreement with Gorbet + Banerjee to include the Terminal Area Development (T.A.I.P.) in their scope of work. The Airport Department and Office of Cultural Affairs agree that this recommendation is an appropriate strategy to insure the efficient delivery of public art for both the North Concourse and the T.A.I.P. The contract amendment allows the team to expand development of the arts infrastructure strategy into the T.A.I.P. and develop a plan associated with using the airfield as an art opportunity for future artists.

The amendment to this design contract was initiated by the Airport Arts Program Oversight Committee (AAPOC) and the Public Art Committee in June 2006 and by the Arts Commission in July 2006. The Arts Commission is responsible for the approval of public art contracts. The details of the contract amendment memorandum were reviewed and coordinated with the Airport Department.

Per the City Council-approved Airport Public Art Master Plan the AAPOC is the body that provides technical and aesthetic review of artwork projects developed for the Airport. The AAPOC's tasks are 1) to develop and recommend an Annual Airport Public Art Work Plan, and 2) to provide professional evaluation of aesthetic and technical issues to the Arts Commission's Public Art Committee during design and development of Airport public art projects. The AAPOC's

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recommendations are reviewed by the Public Art Committee and Arts Commission. The Airport Commission is represented, along with the Arts Commission, on the AAPOC. All of these meetings are publicly noticed.

The Office of Cultural Affairs has agreed to provide information updates on the development of public art at the airport to the Airport Commission on a quarterly basis.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL TO SUBMIT A GRANT APPLICATION FOR EDENVALE LIBRARY

RECOMMENDATION

Adoption of a resolution ratifying the City Manager's application for a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in the amount of \$124,263 for a youth serving facility, and authorizing the execution of all documents necessary to obtain and implement the grant, if awarded.

OUTCOME

Approval of this resolution will enable the City to complete the required documents to secure the \$124,263.

BACKGROUND

The City has an opportunity to apply for a Federal Economic Development Initiative-Special Purpose Grant of \$124,263 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for the construction of a youth serving facility. It is mandatory that all documents related to the grant application and award be completed by September 30, 2006 to secure the funds for the City. Due to the strict timelines for award, staff has submitted the grant application in anticipation of Council approval, and can withdraw the application if Council does not approve it. The City will be responsible for meeting Federal environmental review requirements, maintaining financial records, and complying with reporting requirements.

The City has designated the funds for the construction of an enhanced teen center in the Edenvale Branch Library scheduled for completion in late 2007. Grant requirements and timelines, however, may make it necessary for the City to use the funds for another youth serving facility. If it is determined that the grant cannot be used for the Edenvale Branch Library, the City can select another youth serving construction project and work with HUD to use the funds for that facility.

ANALYSIS

It is necessary for Council to approve this resolution so that the deadlines can be met and the funds secured for the City. If it is determined that the funds cannot be used for the Edenvale Branch Library, there are a number of projects in the capital budget for which the funds could be used. If Council does not approve the resolution, the funds will not be available to the City.

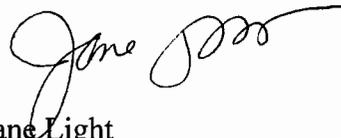

RECOMMENDATION

- (a) Approval of a Cooperation Agreement between City of San José and the County of Santa Clara related to real property issues within the old Civic Center area.
- (b) Adoption of a resolution requesting designation by the federal government of a local redevelopment authority for the Pvt. George L. Richey United States Army Reserve Center (155 West Hedding Street).
- (c) Adoption of a resolution establishing an advisory board for the redevelopment plan for the Pvt. George L. Richey United States Richey Army Reserve Center, located in the old Civic Center Area, and a joint land use advisory committee for the former City Hall site.

OUTCOME

Improved communication and co-operation between the City and County in land use planning in the old Civic Center.

BACKGROUND

The Federal government has declared the Richey Army Reserve Center as surplus and available for re-use. The site is immediately adjacent and integral to the County government operations center (map see attachment A). The County has proposed serving as the Local Redevelopment Agency (L.R.A.) for the site as required by the federal base closure process.

The City desires to undertake a land use planning process where the City would examine, evaluate, and develop a re-use plan for the former City Hall site. This site is immediately adjacent to the County government center. County staff has expressed interest in discussing City plans for the eventual re-use or disposition of the property.

Since both the City and the County want the land use planning in the old Civic Center to proceed expeditiously a co-operative agreement was developed to facilitate this goal.

ANALYSIS

The County will form an L.R.A. for the Richey site which will consist of (3) County staff and (2) City staff. The City Manager shall recommend the City staff to the Board of Supervisors. This advisory committee shall implement the Federal L.R.A. process and make recommendations on

the site redevelopment plan to the Board. The County will provide all administrative support and reimburse the City for staff time, costs and expenses of City staff pursuant to the terms of a federal grant the County has applied for in conjunction with this process.

The City shall form a Land Use Advisory Committee (L.U.A.C.) for the former City Hall site consisting of (3) City staff and (2) County staff to advise the City Council. The County Executive will recommend the County appointments to the City Council. The City is free to form additional advisory boards to assist the Council in determining the re-use of the City Hall site.

It should be noted that the Cooperative Agreement specifies that the City retains all land use authority over both the Richey site and the former City Hall site subject to the County's right to be exempt from the City's zoning and building ordinances as provided by state law. Staff believes this co-operative arrangement will facilitate planning and development in the, County Civic Center, and will serve the mutual interests of the City and County.

A public outreach consistent with Council Policy 6-30 will be undertaken as part of the re-use of the former City hall/ E-Lot site.

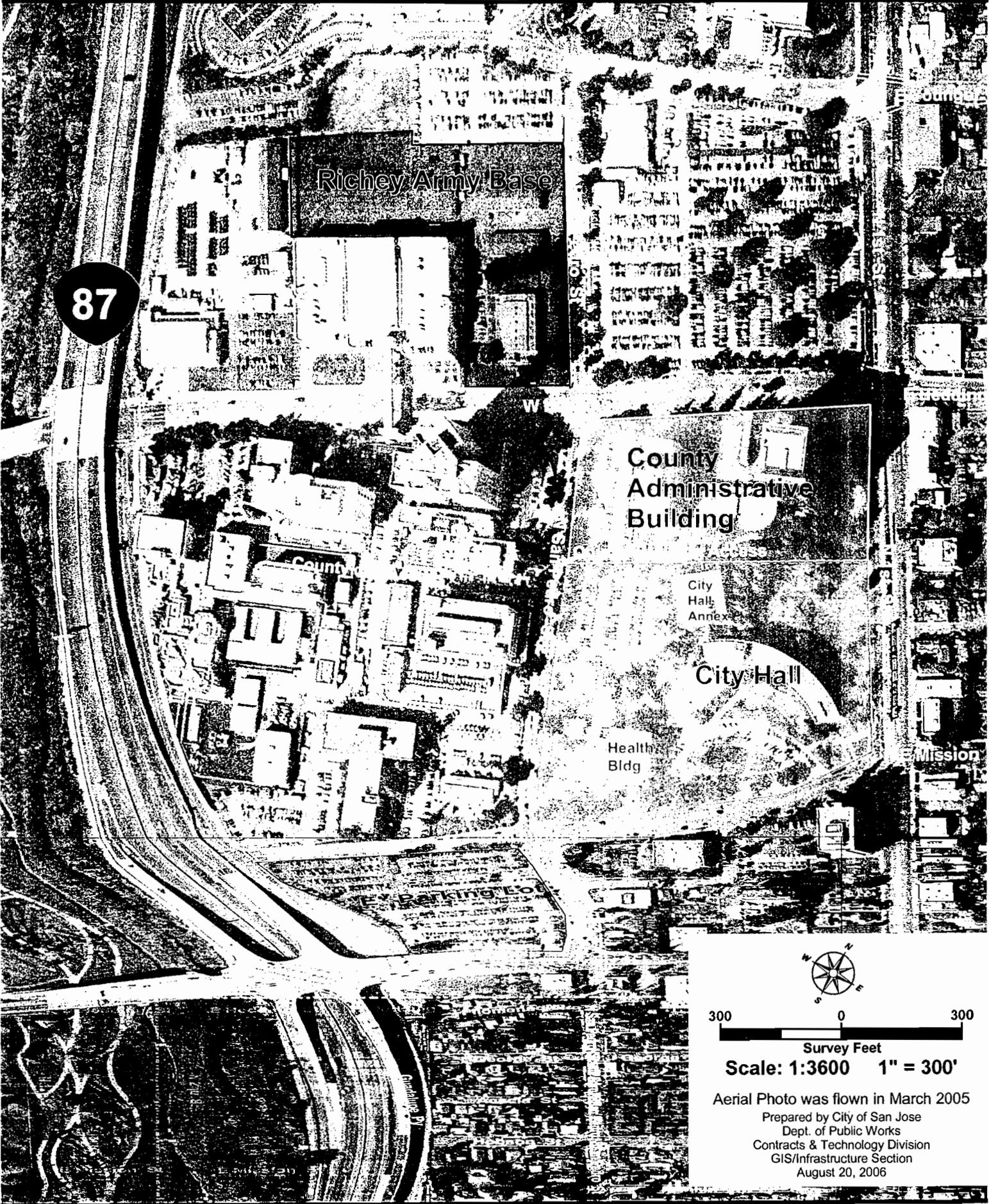

SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS TO THE COUNCIL DISTRICT 3 AND PARKS CITY-WIDE CONSTRUCTION AND CONVEYANCE TAX FUNDS, AND THE LAKE CUNNINGHAM FUND; AND AUTHORIZATION OF A RESOLUTION AMENDING ALLOCATIONS UNDER THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA 2000 AND 2002 PARKS BOND ACTS

RECOMMENDATION

1. Adoption of a resolution amending allocation of amounts for application of local assistance funds for projects from the:
 - a. Roberti-Z'berg-Harris Urban Open Space and Recreation Grant Program under the Safe Neighborhood Parks, Clean Water, Clean Air, and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2000 (Proposition 12);
 - b. Roberti-Z'berg-Harris Urban Open Space and Recreation Grant Program under the 2002 Resources Bond Act (Proposition 40); and
 - c. Per Capita Grant Program under the 2002 Resources Bond Act (Proposition 40) as detailed on Attachments 1, 2, and 3; and authorizing the City Manager to negotiate, execute, and submit all necessary documents for local assistance funds under these grant programs.

2. Adoption of Appropriation Ordinance amendments in the Council District 3 Construction and Conveyance Tax Fund (Fund 380) to:
 - a. Increase the appropriation to the Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Department by \$298,000 for the Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing project; and
 - b. Decrease the Ending Fund Balance by \$298,000.

3. Adoption of Appropriation Ordinance amendments in the Lake Cunningham Fund (Fund 462) to:
 - a. Establish a reserve for Playground ADA Renovations project in the amount of \$94,000; and
 - b. Decrease the Ending Fund Balance in the amount of \$94,000.

4. Adoption of Appropriation Ordinance amendments in the City-wide Parks Construction and Conveyance Tax Fund (Fund 391) to:
 - a. Establish a Global Photon Property Acquisition project to the Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Department in the amount of \$50,000; and
 - b. Decrease the Ending Fund Balance in the amount of \$50,000.

CEQA:

- Guadalupe River Bridge Crossing in Almaden: Mitigated Negative Declaration, PP03-04-110.

- Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River): Mitigated Negative Declaration, PP04-323, May 2005; State Clearinghouse #2005022117, February 2005.

OUTCOME

City Council approval of the recommended actions would authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute agreements with the State and to realign and reallocate planned use of funds to maximize the use of local assistance grant funds available from three State Bond funding programs to complete various parks, trails, and community recreation facilities projects throughout the City.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

City staff recommends approval of the above actions, which will authorize the City Manager to negotiate and execute agreements with the State of California, Resources Agency, Department of Parks and Recreation to reallocate the planned spending of funds from three local assistance grant programs to the approved State grant allocations. The proposed actions will amend appropriations in the City Council District 3 and City-Wide Parks Construction and Conveyance Tax Funds to align City budget sources and uses with the approved State grant funding. Future items will be brought to the City Council to approve specific project plans, award of contract, appropriations or other actions as necessary.

The Overfelt House Renovation has been completed according to the project specifications under the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant agreement and project savings are being redistributed to the

Lake Cunningham ADA Playground, Global Photon Building Acquisition and Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing projects.

In order to meet State project completion deadlines, the Guadalupe River Trail Crossing in Almaden will be replaced by the Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River) project. It is important to note that deferring the Guadalupe River Trail Crossing in Almaden project will have a smaller impact on trail connectivity since the completion of the nearby Coleman Road Pedestrian Bridge which connects the east and west banks of the river.

Lastly, with the completion of acquisition of the Nisich Park site through the use of Redevelopment Agency funding, the recommended actions will revise the scope of the grant-funded project. The grant funds will now pay for Nisich Park development.

Upon City Council approval, City staff will proceed with necessary documentation to the State to implement these recommendations.

BACKGROUND

Securing local assistance funds through various programs established by the State of California, Resources Agency, Department of Parks and Recreation (State) involves multiple steps on the part of the City Administration as detailed below:

- The State requires that the governing body of each agency, the City Council, adopt a resolution that authorizes the City Manager to apply for and accept local assistance grant funds from the State of California for each grant program.
- The State Department of Parks and Recreation approves an allocation of funds to the City through each specific grant program, either a per capita amount or on a competitive application basis.
- Upon award of the funds, the City must execute a contract with the State for the specific grant program and amount. Each contract has a specified termination date by which all approved projects must be completed.
- Once the State approves the program allocation, the City must then submit a specific grant application for each individual project, which details the site ownership, CEQA clearance, budget, scope, and activities that the State is funding in each development.
- Upon State approval of the project specific plan, the City is authorized to proceed with the project.
- The City is reimbursed for eligible project costs.

On January 22, 2002, the City Council adopted Resolution Number 70810 that approved the filing of an application for local assistance funds of up to \$4,293,089 from the Roberti-Z'berg-Harris (RZH) Urban Open Space and Recreation Grant Program under the Safe Neighborhood Parks, Clean Water, Clean Air, and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2000 (Proposition 12) and authorized the City Manager to negotiate and execute all documents relating to the grant funding agreement. A list of six (6) projects, including \$1.4 million allocated to neighborhood parks to be identified at a later date, were approved to be funded under the grant program (Attachment 1). The State approved the City's application under this grant program and on May 15, 2002, the City executed a contract (Contract # C2009300) with the State of California for funding through this source. Subsequently, through various actions, the City Council allocated the \$1.4 million balance to fund the following projects:

- Tully Road Ballfields: Increase funding by \$450,000 to a total of \$1,350,000
- Lone Bluff Mini-Park: Allocate \$500,000
- Selma Olinder Park: Allocate \$100,000
- Sixth and William Park Development (O'Donnell's Gardens Park): Allocate \$250,000
- O'Connor Park Restroom: Allocate \$100,000

Attachment 1 provides the complete listing of projects funded through this source. The City will be reimbursed by the State for eligible project costs under this grant provided that the projects are approved and completed by June 30, 2009.

On January 27, 2004, the City Council adopted Resolution Number 71943, which authorized the City Manager to negotiate, execute and submit an application and all necessary documents for local assistance grant funding of up to \$4,051,000 funding from the Roberti-Z'berg-Harris (RZH) Urban Open Space and Recreation Grant program under the State of California 2002 Resources Bond Act (Proposition 40). The State approved the eight (8) projects to be funded under the grant program (Attachment 2) for grant funding and on February 26, 2004, the City executed a contract (Contract # C0209801) with the State for \$4,051,000 under the Proposition 40 RZH program for projects shown in Attachment 2. The City will be reimbursed by the State for eligible project costs under this grant provided that the projects are approved and completed by June 30, 2011.

Additionally, on January 27, 2004, the City Council adopted Resolution Number 71944, which authorized the City Manager to negotiate, execute and submit an application and all necessary documents for local assistance grant funding of up to to \$4,037,000 in funds from the Per Capita Grant Program under the 2002 Resources Bond Act (Proposition 40). The State approved the eight (8) projects described in Attachment 3 for grant funding and on February 25, 2004, the City executed a contract (Contract #C0207484) with the State for \$4,037,000 under the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant program to be used for projects shown in Attachment 3. The City will be

reimbursed by the State for eligible project costs under this grant provided that the projects are approved and completed by June 30, 2011.

ANALYSIS

Reallocation of Proposition 12 Roberti-Z'berg-Harris (RZH) Funds:

One project allocation previously approved by the City Council for application under Proposition 12 RZH grant program is now recommended to be reallocated to another project. This is funding for the Guadalupe River Trail Bridge Crossing in Almaden (\$273,000) projects.

Staff has determined that the City cannot fully fund and complete a project for the Guadalupe River Trail Bridge Crossing in Almaden by the final due date established in the grant. Additionally, the proposed Bridge Crossing project no longer serves as the only means to provide access between the east and west banks of the river since the completion of the Coleman Road Pedestrian Bridge. Therefore, it is recommended that these funds be reallocated to the Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River) project. The Airport Parkway project has been previously identified as a priority and this recommendation provides necessary funding while maintaining the allocation of State grant funds to support trail access and development activities. City staff will continue work on the Almaden Bridge Crossing project, including efforts to obtain necessary funding.

Reallocation of Proposition 40 Roberti-Z'berg-Harris Funds and Proposition 40 Per Capita Grants:

In 2004, the City submitted project specific grant proposals and the State approved applications under the Proposition 40 Per Capita program for the Global Photon (\$300,000) and Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River) (\$850,000) projects (\$1,150,000 total). These projects were originally designated to be funded under the Proposition 40 RZH program. As a result of the State's approval of funding these two projects under the Per Capita program, it is necessary to shift other projects from the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant fund to the Proposition 40 RZH program. These changes will balance and fully allocate both grant programs and make them consistent with the approved State allotments. As a result, the City will be able to recognize revenues and expenditures under the correct sources and uses.

The Police Activities League (PAL) Stadium and Nisich Park projects were originally designated to be funded under the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant program. The Department of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services (PRNS) recommends that the PAL Stadium (\$250,000) and Nisich Park (\$825,000) projects (\$1,075,000 total) be moved from the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant to the Proposition 40 RZH program.

Use of State grant funds to assist in the renovation of the PAL complex was identified as a priority project as these funds became available. Included in these recommendations, PRNS

proposes to increase the total funding for the PAL Stadium project by \$75,000, to a total of \$325,000. The additional funds had not been allocated to a specific project at the time of the Council's original authorization to apply for and accept the Proposition 40 RZH grant funds.

The Overfelt House Renovation has been completed according to the project specifications under the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant agreement. A savings of \$169,000 was realized in the project. The recommendation reallocates the unspent funds in the Proposition 40 Per Capita fund to other projects: \$94,000 to the Lake Cunningham ADA Playground project; \$50,000 to the Global Photon Building Acquisition; and \$25,000 to the Airport Parkway Trail Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River). This redistribution of funds will result in all grant funds being fully allocated.

The original scope of the Nisich Park project was to fund property acquisition. The project site has been acquired through funding provided by the Redevelopment Agency. Therefore, the recommendation will allow PRNS to utilize \$825,000 in State grant proceeds to fund the development of Nisich Park.

This memorandum includes a recommendation for several appropriation actions, including Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River), Lake Cunningham ADA Playground and Global Photon Building Acquisition. These appropriation actions are necessary to authorize each project to proceed. Since the State grant funds are paid on a reimbursement basis following completion of each project, the funding for each project is typically advanced through the use of the Ending Fund Balance of each respective Council District or City-wide Construction and Conveyance Tax Fund. Upon payment by the State, the appropriate Construction and Conveyance Tax Fund Ending Fund Balance is reimbursed.

All other grant related projects discussed in this memorandum without a corresponding appropriation action will be brought forward for City Council consideration as property acquisition, design and construction or other project activities warrant funding to be in place.

POLICY ALTERNATIVES

Staff has proposed the above recommendations to be as close and consistent as possible with previous Council action and direction regarding the allocation of State Parks and Recreation grant funds. Other alternative projects could be funded through these sources of funds. However, the City must submit new grant applications for specific alternate projects and it may not be possible to secure State approval of these alternates as well as complete all environmental, design and construction activities by the program termination dates. Project delays could place State grant funding for these projects in jeopardy, which could result in project cancellations, additional delays or transfer funding responsibility to other City funding sources.

PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

No specific public outreach has occurred regarding the proposed action. However, all projects will have completed the regular public input process used by PRNS for construction projects. Furthermore, these projects are implementing initiatives stated in the Greenprint, a Twenty-Year Strategic Plan for Parks and Community Facilities and Programs. These funding sources and proposed project uses have previously been approved through the City Council's annual Capital Budget and Five-Year Capital Improvement Program.

COORDINATION

These actions have been coordinated with the City Attorney's Office. Appropriate revisions to the City's grant inventory and single audit functions will be coordinated with the Finance Department upon City Council approval of the recommended actions.

FISCAL/POLICY ALIGNMENT

This project is consistent with the Council-approved Budget Strategy Economic Recovery section in that it will spur construction spending in our local economy.

COST SUMMARY/COST IMPLICATIONS

The following summarizes cost implications to individual projects:

- **Guadalupe River Trail Bridge Crossing in Almaden:** Decrease funding by \$273,000 in the Proposition 12 Roberti-Z'berg-Harris (RZH) grant program.
- **Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River):** Increase funding by \$273,000 in the Proposition 12 Roberti-Z'berg-Harris (RZH) grant program.

- **Overfelt House Renovation:** Decrease funding by \$169,000 in the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant allocation due to cost savings.
- **Lake Cunningham Playground ADA Renovations:** Increase funding allocation by \$94,000 in the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant funding.
- **Global Photon Property Acquisition:** Increase funding allocation by \$50,000 through the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant program.
- **Trail: Airport Parkway Under Crossing (Lower Guadalupe River):** Increase funding allocation by \$25,000 in the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant program.
- **PAL Stadium ADA Restroom Renovations:** Increase funding allocation by \$75,000 in the Proposition 40 Per Capita grant program.
- **Unallocated Funds:** Utilizes the \$75,000 that had not been allocated to a specific project at the time of the Council’s original authorization to apply for and accept the Proposition 40 RZH grant funds. These funds are now recommended for allocation to the PAL Stadium project.

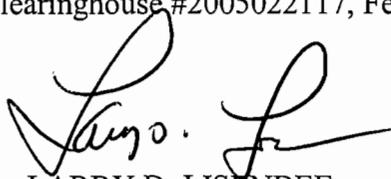
