BACKGROUND

Established in 2001, the Workforce Investment Network Board of Directors is composed of representatives of employers, educators, and economic development and community service organizations throughout its service area. Nominations for board appointments are regularly submitted to the Network office by current board members, outside businesses and community sources. These nominations are considered and evaluated for future appointments on an ongoing basis. The Workforce Investment Board currently has 40 members: 17 public sector and 23 business/private industry representatives.

Ms. Campbell is the human resources manager of IBM's Silicon Valley Labs site information management. She began her career with IBM in 2000 in the Engineer Science division. She later joined IBM Global Services as an HR transition manager where she was responsible for designing and communicating terms and conditions of engagement contracts. She was also the HR leader of the Boulder, Colorado site for IBM's Printing Systems Division. Prior to IBM, Ms. Campbell worked for both non-profit and for-profit organizations including four years as a high school teacher.

Mr. VanHuystee is the senior regional manager and First Vice President for Washington Mutual Bank in the greater San José market. He has worked in the financial services industry for more than 24 years, beginning as a part-time teller while a student at San José State University. He has held a variety of banking positions, including manager for Eureka Federal Savings and financial

center manager for Great Western Bank. Currently, he is the Northern California executive on the California market leadership team for community reinvestment act activities. In addition he is a community volunteer, serving as chair for the American Heart Association Annual Heart Walk and president of his church's day school.

To achieve the goals of the federal Workforce Investment Act, the SVWIN board works collaboratively to link effective job training for individuals with workforce development for employers. Creating these linkages is critical to ensuring that our residents are prepared with the appropriate skills and training as they enter or return to the job market.
