RECOMMENDATION

Conduct a Public Hearing and adopt an ordinance to establish a Rule 20A Underground Utility District along Coleman Avenue, between West Hedding Street and Spring Street, North Market Street between West Julian Street and West St. James Street, and Devine Street between North San Pedro Street and North First Street.

OUTCOME

Approval of this ordinance will establish the Coleman Avenue Underground Utility District in accordance with the San José Municipal Code. In addition, it will enable City staff to direct utility companies to begin design of the project. Establishment of this district will improve the appearance, pedestrian mobility and ease of utility equipment maintenance within the area described above.

BACKGROUND

Through Rule 20A, the CPUC requires Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) to annually set aside funds for financing the undergrounding of overhead distribution facilities located on public streets within the City of San José. The CPUC also requires AT&T, through Rule 32, to set aside funds for undergrounding its facilities where PG&E has been required to underground. Comcast is required by the City's franchise agreement to budget funds to similarly participate in projects where the PG&E Rule 20A and AT&T Rule 32 funds are programmed for undergrounding.

The proposed Coleman Avenue Rule 20A Underground Utility District (District) is included in the revised 2007/2008 – 2012/13 Rule 20A and Rule 20B (In-Lieu Fee) Underground Utility Program Three-Year Workplan, approved by Council in April 2008. It meets criteria approved by the CPUC and the criteria established by the City in 1978 to complete projects that front city

facilities, such as parks, libraries, and fire stations.

ANALYSIS

On April 22, 2009, notices of a public hearing were mailed to all utility companies, owners of property, and owners adjacent to the proposed District.

A schedule for establishment and implementation of the proposed Underground Utility District is presented in Attachment B.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

Upon City Council's approval of the ordinance at the public hearing, utility companies will begin design of the project. Once the design is near completion, Public Works will mail electrical service conversion packets to all property owners that need their electrical service panel converted to receive service from the new underground system. Public Works and utility companies will closely coordinate design and electrical conversion work with the property owners. In addition, continuous coordination will occur during the design and construction phases of the project with the adjacent property owners and other stakeholders, such as the San José Redevelopment Agency.

PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

- Criterion 1:** Requires Council action on the use of public funds equal to \$1 million or greater. **(Required: Website Posting)**
- Criterion 2:** Adoption of a new or revised policy that may have implications for public health, safety, quality of life, or financial/economic vitality of the City. **(Required: E-mail and Website Posting)**
- Criterion 3:** Consideration of proposed changes to service delivery, programs, staffing that may have impacts to community services and have been identified by staff, Council or a Community group that requires special outreach. **(Required: E-mail, Website Posting, Community Meetings, Notice in appropriate newspapers)**

The action requested by Council does not meet any of the three criteria listed above, but the following outreach will be conducted as part of Section 15.24 of the Municipal Code for the purposes of establishing underground districts.

A community meeting was held on March 18, 2009, to inform the public of this undergrounding project. The property owners attending were concerned with the cost of conversions, process to upgrade services, and phasing of construction (service interruptions). Staff provided information on options to minimize cost of conversions and explained the PG&E policy and procedure for the \$1,500 service conversion reimbursement. Property owners were informed that staff would provide contact information and deadlines to ensure upgrades were appropriately incorporated into the undergrounding design. Upgrades to existing panels and electrical service, if desired by the property owner, would require additional non-reimbursable costs.

PG&E may assume the responsibility of converting the electrical service panels instead of requiring the property owners to hire an electrical contractor. If PG&E performs the service conversion work, delays caused by some of the property owners' for non-compliance would be eliminated.

Furthermore, property owners were assured that the utilities would minimize impacts of service interruptions and provide approximately one-month notification of service interruptions. It was explained that power interruptions typically last 3 to 4 hours and other utility interruptions are shorter duration. In general, the attendees supported the undergrounding and were satisfied with the responses from staff.

Upon Council's approval of the ordinance at the public hearing, Public Works will mail a notice of adoption of ordinance to all utility companies, and property owners of property adjoining the proposed District.

Prior to the start of construction activities, PG&E will place "Door Hanger" construction notices on properties adjoining the proposed District and those affected by construction.

This memorandum will be posted on the City's website for the June 2, 2009, Council agenda. On May 18, 2009, staff will transmit a supplemental memo should any comments or protest be received for consideration at the public hearing.

COORDINATION

The establishment of the proposed District and project schedule has been coordinated with the Department of Transportation, the San José Redevelopment Agency, City Manager's Budget Office, and Planning, Building and Code Enforcement Department. In addition, the project has been coordinated with Santa Clara Valley Water District, PG&E, AT&T, and Comcast. This memo and the required ordinance to set the establish District have been reviewed by the City Attorney's Office.



UNDERGROUND UTILITY DISTRICT along Coleman Avenue between West Hedding Street and Spring Street, North Market Street between West Julian Street and West St. James Street, and Devine Street between North San Pedro Street and North First Street.

Establishment Schedule

April 21, 2009	City Council adopts a resolution setting a time and place for a Public Hearing.
April 22, 2009	Director of Public Works mails a notice of Public Hearing to all adjacent property owners.
May 11, 2009	Director of Public Works transmits a report of comments and/or protests received for consideration at the Public Hearing.
June 2, 2009	City Council conducts a Public Hearing and at its conclusion approves an Ordinance establishing Coleman Avenue Rule 20A Underground Utility District.

Project Implementation Schedule

September 2009	Utility companies begin design of substructure, conduit, vaults, electric and cable facilities.
April 2010	Utilities obtain environmental clearances.
December 2010	Construction starts.
January 2012	Utility companies complete connections and remove overhead wires and poles.
