


AB109/AB117 in a nutshell

- ✓ Began October 1, 2011
- ✓ Low level sentenced felons go to jail instead of prison (non-violent, non-serious, non-high risk sex offenders)
- ✓ Non-violent, non-serious, non-high risk sex offenders released to County post-release community supervision
- ✓ Parole violators serve time in County jail not prison
- ✓ Expands alternative custody for local commitments
- ✓ No state prison inmates will be transferred to county jail
- ✓ No state prison inmates will be released early to County post-release community supervision
- ✓ Local planning (Community Corrections Partnership)









Summary of Recommendations

Approved by the Community Corrections Partnership August 25, 2011

- Support and strengthen relationships with local law enforcement agencies and task force teams to ensure public safety and offender accountability.
- Consider and adopt the Public Safety Realignment Implementation Plan as Santa Clara County's Public Safety Realignment Plan as required by Section 1230.1 of the Penal Code and the Post Release Community Supervision strategy as required by Section 3451 of the Penal Code, as added by the Post Release Community Supervision Act of 2011 contained in AB 109. This plan contains recommendations for implementation including using funds allocated by the State to successfully implement the plan.
- Support ongoing efforts to implement evidence based practices in the supervision and case management of all adult offenders in Santa Clara County with the goal of reducing recidivism.
- Continue to explore options to leverage community and treatment resources in order to provide effective evidence based programs to adult offenders.
- Strategize to reduce racial and ethnic disparities at key decision points across the criminal justice system.







Proposed Outcome Measures

- Increase the use of community sanctions and programs (both for lower level felons, parole violators, and community supervision clients).
- Increase the connections and coordination between offenders and potentially helpful people and services in the community. Including family, educators, potential employers, and faith-based agencies.
- Develop an efficient system that strengthens cross agency coordination and use of services.
- Increased outcomes as it pertains to housing, sobriety, and employment.
- Reduce offender recidivism rates.
- Reduce prison commitments from the counties, thus reducing the overall prison population.
- Reduce racial and ethnic disparities in key decisions across the criminal justice system.


VISION

Aligning Re-Entry & Realignment

In Process:

- Build a re-entry process in the County jail system and embark on a re-entry pilot in County Jail.
- Recidivism Study to assist with in-custody programming and re-entry planning
- County and City to work together to improve existing efforts for young adults between 18 and 24 years.

Work Plan Phase I:

July 1 – December 31, 2011

1. Network continues to meet to inform, plan, and leverage.
2. Build the mechanism for a re-entry process in the County jail system.
3. Plan for impacts of State realignment (AB 109).
4. Improve existing efforts for transition age youth up to 24 years.
5. Pursue grant funding.

Work Plan Phase II:

January 1 – July 31, 2012

1. Utilize the Recidivism Study to direct the Reentry Network work plan.
2. Align in-custody programming and reentry plans.
3. Embark on re-entry pilot in County jail system.
