RECOMMENDATION

Accept the staff memorandum and attached 2007 State Legislative Bill Matrix dated June 1, 2007, concerning proposed State legislation in the area of public safety, and strategic services including fiscal related measures.

BACKGROUND

Included in the Public Safety, Finance and Strategic Support Committee workplan for 2007 is the request for a Legislative Update to be brought forward to the Committee by the City Manager's Office of Intergovernmental Relations.

ANALYSIS

The 2007-2008 State Legislative session convened in Sacramento on January 3, and the deadline for bills to be introduced in the State Legislature was February 23. Proposed legislation included in the attached matrix reflects bills introduced in Sacramento in the areas of public safety, strategic services and fiscal related measures. The next major bill deadline in the Legislature is June 8, which is the last day for bills to pass out of their house of origin. Bills that do not pass out of their house of origin may become a "two-year" bill and can be heard again in 2008.

- Criteria 2:** Adoption of a new or revised policy that may have implications for public health, safety, quality of life, or financial/economic vitality of the City. **(Required: E-mail and Website Posting)**


