SUBJECT: ACCEPTANCE OF THE JUNE 2007 STATE LEGISLATIVE BILL MATRIX

RECOMMENDATION

That the Rules and Open Government Committee accept the June 7, 2007, State Legislative Bill Matrix.

OUTCOME

That the Rules and Open Government and City Council have the opportunity to receive information on pending bills in the State Legislature of interest to the City as they relate to the City's 2007 Legislative Guidelines and Priorities.

BACKGROUND

The Council reviewed and recommended on January 30, the City's Legislative Priorities for 2007, which included proposed City sponsored/supported legislation in certain areas of interest and concern to the Council. The 2007 State Legislative Matrix is divided into subject areas based on the City's defined City Service Areas (CSAs) with each bill listed with author, subject, final status and City position. The attached 2007 Legislative Bill Matrix identifies legislation where the City has taken specific positions or bills identified as having unique or potential impact on the City and the adopted legislative priorities.

ANALYSIS

The attached bill matrix includes highlights of legislation introduced during the current State Legislative Session which implement the City's adopted legislative priorities. Many of these measures have been referred to the relevant City departments for review, analysis and possible recommendations to the City Council for official City positions. Of particular note, the following is an update on legislation that the Council has taken positions on:

AB 57 (Soto) – Safe Routes to School Construction Program.

Deletes the repeal date of the Safe Routes to School Construction Program and of provisions authorizing state and local entities to secure and expend federal funds for programs related to bicycles and pedestrian safety and traffic-calming measures in high-hazard locations.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 3/28.

City Position: Support.

AB 81 (Torrico) – Child Protection: Safe Surrender.

Amends existing law designating certain locations as safe-surrender sites. Provides that those provisions apply to children of a certain age. Permits a local fire agency to designate a safe-surrender site. Specifies certain circumstances in which a safe-surrender site and its personnel have no liability for a surrendered child.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 6/1.

City Position: Support.

AB 145 (Coto) – San Jose State University and National Hispanic University Collaboration.

Requires the State University Trustees to authorize San Jose State University and the National Hispanic University to enter into a collaboration agreement that would include outreach, transfer, joint classes for credit, and other programs of education, research and public services as the Trustees and the National Hispanic University deem to be in the public interest. The collaboration agreement would include a five-year pilot program to improve participation in higher education.

Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee on 5/31.

Amended: 4/26.

City Position: Support.

AB 239 (DeSaulnier) – Recording Fees: Contra Costa and San Mateo Counties.

Authorizes the Contra Costa County and San Mateo County boards of supervisors to charge a flat fee for each document that is recorded, if the document is more than one page, for every real estate instrument, paper or notice required or permitted by law to be recorded. Requires the counties' boards of supervisors, if they charge this fee, to establish a fund which shall be used to assist in the development of affordable housing for extremely low-, very low-, low-, and moderate-income housing.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 4/30.

City Position: Watch.

AB 468 (Ruskin) – Vehicles: Abatement of Abandoned Vehicles.

Authorizes a county service authority to use registration fees, as well as the moneys received from the Abandoned Vehicle Trust Fund, for the costs associated with the enforcement of the ordinance adopted by the authority. Prohibits the authority from offsetting other specified costs and from carrying out an abandoned vehicle abatement unless a specified notice is issued and the notice period has expired.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 6/1.

City Position: Support.

AB 763 (Saldana) – Condominium Conversion: Tenant Notification.

Recasts the specified prohibitions and changes to the Subdivision Map Act, which prohibits a legislative body from approving a final map for a subdivision to be created from the conversion of residential real property into a condominium project, a community apartment project, or a stock cooperative project, unless there has been compliance with certain tenant notice requirements.

Status: Senate Committee on Judiciary.

Amended: 5/31.

City Position: Support.

AB 927 (Saldana) – Multifamily Housing Program.

Requires the percentage of the total assistance provided under the Multifamily Housing Program that is expended for senior rental housing developments to be equal to the percentage of lower income renter households in the state that are lower-income elderly renter households, as reported by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development on the basis of the most recent decennial census conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau.

Status: Senate Committee on Transportation and Housing.

Amended: 4/30.

City Position: Support.

AB 1252 (Caballero) – Housing-Related Parks Program.

Creates the Housing-Related Parks Program to be administered by the Department of Parks and Recreation, using the \$200 million in funds authorized by Proposition 1C, to provide grants to cities and counties for creation or rehabilitation of parks in conjunction with eligible housing projects. Eligible cities and counties shall demonstrate a deficit in parks or park acreage; adopt a housing element relative to housing goals and affordable housing; meet or exceed housing production thresholds; and issue a building permit for a housing project in which at least 25% of the units will be affordable to very low or low income households.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 5/2.

City Position: Support with amendments.

AB 1460 (Saldana) – Multifamily Housing Program: Project Prioritization.

Requires the Department of Housing and Community Development to award reasonable priority points for projects to prioritize sustainable building methods established in accordance with certain criteria listed under state regulations relating to federal and state low-income housing tax credits.

Status: Senate Transportation and Housing Committee.

Amended: N/A.

City Position: Support.

SB 46 (Perata) – Proposition 1C: Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account.

Provides the statutory framework for expenditure of the \$850 million in Proposition 1C's Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account. Requires the Department of Housing and Community Development to administer a competitive program to provide capital outlay grants for infill housing development and for related infrastructure that is an integral part of the infill housing development.

Status: Assembly Desk.

Amended: 6/4.

City Position: Support with amendments.

SB 49 (Migden) – Local Government: Financial Assistance: Sports Franchises.

Prohibits a local agency or redevelopment agency from providing financial assistance to a sports stadium project that involves the relocation of a professional sports franchise from the territorial jurisdiction of one local agency to another within the same market area. Provides that this prohibition does not apply to local agency financial assistance in the construction of public improvements that serve all or a portion of the jurisdiction of the local agency.

Status: Senate Local Government Committee.

Amended: 2/22.

City Position: Oppose.

SB 286 (Lowenthal/ Dutton) – Transportation Bonds: Implementation.

Requires the first payments of Proposition 1B funds for local street and road purposes to be allocated by the Controller. Requires the Controller to use certain population figures in making allocations to cities. Requires an applicant for funds to submit a list of projects expected to be funded to the Department of Transportation. Requires the funds to be allocated within three fiscal years of the date of allocation. Requires return of unallocated funds..

Status: Assembly Desk.

Amended: 6/4.

City Position: Support.

SB 586 (Dutton) – Affordable Housing Innovation Fund: California Affordable Housing Revolving Development and Acquisition Program.

Earmarks the \$100 million in Proposition 1C's Affordable Housing Innovation Fund for four distinct programs. Establishes the CA Affordable Housing Revolving Development and Acquisition Program within the Department of Housing and Community Development for the purpose of providing loans to purchase real property for the development or preservation of housing affordable for lower-income households. Through a competitive process, HCD shall select a private program manager to review and approve loan applications and originate and service loans. Requires HCD to grant preference to a housing trust fund that declares its intention to provide more than 65% of available funds to a specified first-time homebuyers' program and to set aside funding for a specified 36-month period for newly established housing trust funds that are in a county with a population of less than 260,000 persons when awarding the \$35 million under the local housing trust fund matching grant program.

Status: Assembly Desk.
Amended: 4/24.
City Position: Oppose, unless amended.

SB 641 (Corbett) – Vehicle Rental Agreements: San Jose Airport.

Repeals Section 1936.5 of the Civil Code, which specifically authorizes San Jose International Airport to design and construct a consolidated rental car facility and/or a common use transportation system, subject to specified cost restrictions, and permits the San Jose International Airport to collect a separate, unbundled fee of up to \$10.15 per rental transaction to recoup its design, construction, and financing costs upon the commencement of operations of the consolidated facility.

Status: Assembly Committee on Judiciary. **Amended:** N/A.
City Position: Sponsor/ Support.

SB 966 (Simitian) – Pharmaceutical Drug Disposal.

Requires every retailer of a drug to have a system in place for the acceptance and collection of drugs for proper disposal that includes specified elements. Provides that the bill does not apply to a controlled substance.

Status: Assembly Desk. **Amended:** 4/30.
City Position: Support.

- Criteria 1:** Requires Council action on the use of public funds equal to \$1 million or greater. **(Required: Website Posting)**
- Criteria 2:** Adoption of a new or revised policy that may have implications for public health, safety, quality of life, or financial/economic vitality of the City. **(Required: E-mail and Website Posting)**
- Criteria 3:** Consideration of proposed changes to service delivery, programs, staffing that may have impacts to community services and have been identified by staff, Council or a Community group that requires special outreach. **(Required: E-mail, Website Posting, Community Meetings, Notice in appropriate newspapers)**
