**SUBJECT: ACCEPTANCE OF THE SEPTEMBER 25, 2007 STATE LEGISLATIVE
BILL MATRIX**

RECOMMENDATION

That the Rules and Open Government Committee accept the September 25, 2007, State Legislative Bill Matrix.

BACKGROUND

That the Rules and Open Government and City Council have the opportunity to receive information on pending bills in the State Legislature of interest to the City as they relate to the City's 2007 Legislative Guidelines and Priorities.

The Council reviewed and recommended on January 30, the City's Legislative Priorities for 2007, which included proposed City sponsored/ supported legislation in certain areas of interest and concern to the Council. The 2007 State Legislative Matrix is divided into subject areas based on the City's defined City Service Areas (CSAs) with each bill listed with author, subject, final status and City position. The attached 2007 Legislative Bill Matrix identifies legislation where the City has taken specific positions or bills identified as having unique or potential impact on the City and the adopted legislative priorities.

All bills passed by the Legislature and sent to the Governor by September 14, 2007, are subject to an October 14 deadline for the Governor to sign, veto or to become law without signature. Bills signed by the Governor will take effect January 1, 2008, unless they contain an urgency clause or have a delayed date of enactment.

ANALYSIS

The attached bill matrix includes highlights of legislation introduced during the current State Legislative Session which implement the City's adopted legislative priorities. Many of these measures have been referred to the relevant City departments for review, analysis and possible recommendations to the City Council for official City positions. Of particular note, the following is an update on legislation that the Council has taken positions on, and legislation staff is monitoring for possible City positions:

AB 31 (De Leon) – Prop. 84: Park Development and Community Revitalization.

Changes the name of the Urban Park Act of 2006, to the Statewide Park Development and Community Revitalization Act of 2007. Provides that a city, district, joint powers authority, specified nonprofit organization, or county is authorized to apply for local assistance program grants. Replaces the term "heavily urbanized county" with "critically underserved community" and expands the definition to include a community with less than three acres of usable parkland per 1,000 residents or is a disadvantaged community and can demonstrate to the Department of Parks and Recreation that the community has insufficient or no park and recreation facilities. Revises the criteria for awarding grants and requires the department to adopt guidelines and technical assistance for grant applicants. Provides that funds under Prop. 84 and this bond act shall be distributed to counties based on population.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 9/7.

AB 57 (Soto) – Highways: Federal Funds: Safe Routes to School.

Deletes the sunset date and extends indefinitely the Safe Routes to School program and requires any annual budget allocation to fund grants under this program, in addition to available federal funding. Authorizes state and local entities to secure and expend federal funds appropriated under the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users for programs relating to highway safety improvements that can reduce the number of fatal and serious injury accidents. Requires the Department of Transportation to administer the Safe Routes to School program and to distribute any federal funds under the competitive grant process.

AB 81 (Torrico) – Child Protection: Safe Surrender.

Extends the safe surrender of a child by a parent or other person with lawful custody from 72 hours old or younger to 7 days of age or younger. Expands the definition of "safe-surrender site" to include local fire agencies upon the approval of the appropriate local governing body of the agency. Specifies the certain circumstances in which a safe-surrender site and its personnel have no liability for a surrendered child. Requires the establishment of a public awareness campaign.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/4.

City Position: Support.

AB 83 (Lieber) – Property Tax Administration: PARE Program.

Establishes the State-County Property Assessment and Revenue for Education Funding Program under which a county that enacts a specified resolution and meets certain conditions receives moneys for specified property tax administration purposes. Specifies that funds received under the program would be under the administrative control of the county auditor, but the county assessor would direct the expenditure of these funds. Provides a reduction in funding for failure to meet performance goals.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee Suspense File.

Amended: 8/27.

AB 113 (Beall) – Hospitals: Reduction or Elimination of EMS: Notice

Permits a county board of supervisors to designate a general acute hospital located within the county that is not a county hospital, as an essential community facility in accordance with specified procedures. Requires the county to form a county essential community facilities committee to collect information and consider specified factors in assessing each hospital in the county. Requires that any facility that is designated as such facility, as a condition of licensure, to furnish a performance bond.

Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee on 5/31.

Amended: 4/18.

AB 117 (Beall) – Traffic Offenses: Additional Assessment: Traffic Safety.

Authorizes Santa Clara County to impose an additional assessment of \$2 for every \$10 on each base fine for any Vehicle Code violation, to be used for programs that increase local traffic safety. Requires the collected assessments be deposited in a Traffic Safety Committee Network Fund.

Status: Senate Committee on Public Safety.

Amended: 3/22.

AB 145 (Coto) – San Jose State University and National Hispanic University Collaboration.

Requires the State University Trustees to authorize San Jose State University and the National Hispanic University to enter into a collaboration agreement that would include outreach, transfer, joint classes for credit, and other programs of education, research and public services as the Trustees and the National Hispanic University deem to be in the public interest. The collaboration agreement would include a five-year pilot program to improve participation in higher education.

Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee on 5/31.

Amended: 4/26.

City Position: Support.

AB 193 (Assembly Committee on Budget) – Transportation Revenues.

Clarifies the general reporting requirements for the Local Streets and Roads program to be administered by the Department of Finance (DOF) and eliminates duplication of oversight provisions included in the Prop. 1B trailer bill, SB 88. Before a city can receive an allocation, a city must submit a list of projects to be funded to DOF who will report on a monthly basis to the State Controller which agencies have submitted project lists. The Controller will then allocate Prop. 1B funding directly to cities.

AB 196 (Assembly Committee on Budget) – Transportation Bond Funds: Cities and Counties (contains language previously pursued in SB 286).

Provides that \$950 million in Prop. 1B funds is appropriated in 2007-08 from the \$2 billion Local Streets and Roads Account. The bill allocates \$550 million for cities and \$400 million for counties. The remainder of funds in the Local Streets and Roads Account will be subject to future appropriation. The City of San Jose is estimated to receive \$15.7 million or \$16.13 per capita in 2007-08. San Jose's remaining share is estimated to be \$14.8 million for a future allocation determined by how efficiently the City uses the bond funds.

AB 239 (DeSaulnier) – Recording Fees: Contra Costa and San Mateo Counties.

Authorizes the boards of supervisors in the counties of Contra Costa and San Mateo to charge a flat fee for each document that is recorded, if the document is more than one page, for every real estate instrument, paper or notice required or permitted by law to be recorded. Requires the boards of supervisors, if they charge this fee, to establish a fund which shall be used to assist in the development of affordable housing for extremely low-, very low-, low-, and moderate-income housing.

Status: Senate Committees on Local Government, and Judiciary.

Amended: 4/30.

City Position: Watch.

AB 414 (Jones) – Local Planning: Residential Development.

Limits the manner in which a city, county, or city and county jurisdiction utilizes, in identifying land suitable for residential development to meet the jurisdiction's share of the regional housing need, vacant sites zoned for nonresidential use that allows residential development, and for which the applicable zoning and development standards allow substantially all of the site to be developed without residential use. Redefines lower residential density for planning and zoning law purposes.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/7.

AB 444 (Hancock) – Congestion Management: Vehicle Registration Fees.

Authorizes the county congestion management agency in the counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Santa Clara, and Solano to impose an annual fee, up to \$10 per vehicle, on motor vehicles registered within the county for programs and projects for certain purposes, and requires voter approval of the measure. Requires the Department of Motor Vehicles, if requested, to collect and distribute the fee to the agency. Provides that the fees may be used only for programs and projects bearing a benefit to vehicle owners paying the fee.

AB 468 (Ruskin) – Vehicles: Abatement of Abandoned Vehicles.

Authorizes a county service authority to use registration fees, as well as funds received from the Abandoned Vehicle Trust Fund, for the costs associated with the enforcement of the ordinance adopted by the authority. Prohibits the authority from offsetting other specified costs and from carrying out the abandoned vehicle abatement unless a specified notice is issued and the notice period has expired.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 8/29.

City Position: Support.

AB 534 (Smyth) – Crimes Against Children (Gut and amended on 8/28 – previously related to Bicycle Transportation Account: Funding).

The prior version related to increasing the amount of a monthly transfer of funds from the Highway Users Tax Account to the Bicycle Transportation Account from \$416,667 to \$1 million each month until January 31, 2012.

As currently amended, the bill makes it a misdemeanor for any person to publish information about a child with the intent that another person will use the information to commit a crime against a child or the information is likely to aid in the imminent commission of a crime against a child.

Status: Senate Committee on Rules.

Amended: 9/5.

City Position: Gut and amended – no position.

AB 548 (Levine) – Solid Waste: Multifamily Dwellings.

Requires an owner of a multifamily dwelling to arrange for recycling services that are appropriate for the multifamily dwelling, consistent with state or local laws or requirements, including a local ordinance or agreement, applicable to the collection, handling or recycling of solid waste.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 6/19.

City Position: Support with Amendments (see SB 1021).

AB 662 (Ruskin) – Water Conservation.

Provides that the standards for minimum levels of operating efficiency for appliances be based upon feasible and attainable efficiencies, or other feasible improved efficiencies, that will reduce the energy or water consumption growth rates and that do not result in any added total costs over the designated life of the appliances concerned.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/7.

AB 712 (De Leon) – Solid Waste and Recycling: Vehicle Clean Air Program.

Creates a fee for solid waste disposal at the disposal facility. Creates the Off-Road Solid Waste and Recycling Vehicle Clean Air Account. Distributes the fees to an operator of an off-road solid waste, composting and recycling vehicle for the costs of complying with a certain State Air Resources Board regulation. Awards grants for projects that divert organic materials from disposal in order to reduce greenhouse gas emission from landfills. Requires the ARB to provide specified related reports.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee Suspense File.

AB 763 (Saldana) – Condominium Conversion: Tenant Notification.

Recasts the specified prohibitions and changes to the Subdivision Map Act, which prohibits a legislative body from approving a final map for a subdivision to be created from the conversion of residential real property into a condominium project, a community apartment project, or a stock cooperative project, unless there has been compliance with certain tenant notice requirements.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 6/25.

City Position: Support.

AB 830 (Ma) – Outdoor Advertising.

Relates to the Outdoor Advertising Act, which regulates the placement of advertising signs adjacent to and within specified distances of highways that are part of the national system of interstate and defense highways and federal-aid highways, and prohibits displays from being placed or maintained on property adjacent to a section of a freeway that has been landscaped. Authorizes the conversion of a permitted advertising display for use as a message center, subject to specified conditions.

Status: Senate Committee on Transportation and Housing.

Amended: 5/15.

City Position: Oppose.

AB 845 (Bass) – Foster Youth: Transitional Housing: Funding.

Appropriates \$10.5 million to the Department of Social Services to fund increased costs for the Transitional Housing for Foster Youth Program in the 2006-07 fiscal year, in augmentation of a specified provision of the Budget Act. The State Budget trailer bill includes funding appropriation for this program, including \$10.5 million to reimburse counties for 2006-07 expenditures and \$25 million for 2007-08.

Status: Senate Floor.

Amended: 5/24.

City Position: Watch.

AB 887 (De La Torre) – Redevelopment: Eminent Domain: Assistance.

Requires a redevelopment agency to comply with certain notification requirements prior to adopting a resolution of necessity for the purposes of acquiring property by eminent domain, and with a specified time prior to taking certain action relating to redevelopment. Requires the agency to provide certain relocation assistance to small businesses that are displaced by redevelopment and do not participate in the redevelopment project.

Status: Senate Floor Inactive File.

Amended: 7/18.

City Position: Watch (See also ACA 8).

AB 927 (Saldana) – Multifamily Housing Program.

Requires the percentage of the total assistance provided under the Multifamily Housing Program that is awarded for units restricted to senior citizens, to be equal to the percentage of lower-income renter households in the state that are lower-income elderly renter households, as reported by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development on the basis of the most recent decennial census conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/5.

AB 1030 (Caballero) – Libraries: Literacy and English Acquisition Services.

Authorizes the Library Literacy and English Acquisition Services Program to be used for services targeted to young adults, 16 years of age and older and who are not enrolled in school, to improve their literacy skills by providing adult basic literacy tutoring and related services. Requires a public library to perform certain functions in implementing this service program. Deletes the requirement that the program have private financial support.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 7/5.

City Position: Support.

AB 1053 (Nunez) – Prop. 1C: Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account: Programs (see also SB 465).

The prior version of the bill provided statutory framework for expenditure of \$850 million in the Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account, and required appropriations from specified accounts for brownfield cleanup that promotes infill housing development and other related development, for qualifying infill infrastructure projects, for Multifamily Housing Program projects, and for the Workforce Housing Reward Program. Required funding to a city or county, or city and county, for housing development whose elements are likely to achieve a reduction of greenhouse gas emissions.

As currently amended, the bill expands the definition of "eligible applicant" for purposes of the Infill Incentive Grant Program of 2007 to include a city, county, city and county, public housing authority, or redevelopment agency that has jurisdiction over a qualifying infill area and applies for funding jointly with an owners' association for a business or property improvement district that includes a qualifying infill area.

Amended: 9/7.

City Position: Support with Amendments.

AB 1091 (Bass) – Prop. 1C: Transit-Oriented Development Implementation Program.

Requires the Department of Housing and Community Development to establish guidelines for the distribution of \$300 million, made available under the Transit-Oriented Development Implementation Program, based on certain criteria relating to providing multiple benefits, coordinating funding from sources other than bond funds derived under the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2006. Authorizes financial assistance to specified entities for housing developments that are located within ½ mile of a transit station via a readily walkable route. The budget appropriates \$95 million for transit-oriented development in 2007-08.

AB 1184 (Lieber) – Closure of Agnews Developmental Center.

Amends the Lanterman Developmental Disabilities Services Act to require the Director of the Department of Developmental Services to establish an Agnews Developmental Center Transition Advisory Task Force as part of the Bay Area Management System, consisting of current and former residents of Agnews and their family members, for the purpose of monitoring community placements of transitioned consumers and making recommendations to the department, regional centers and the Legislature.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/5.

AB 1252 (Caballero) – Prop. 84: Statewide Park Development and Community Revitalization Act of 2007 (Gut and amended on 9/7 – previously related to Prop. 1C: Housing-Related Parks Program).

The prior version of the bill established the Housing-Related Parks Program under Prop. 1C, and required the Department of Housing and Community Development to use the \$200 million in funds from the Housing Urban-Suburban-and-Rural Parks Account, to provide grants for the creation, development or rehabilitation of community or neighborhood parks to cities and counties that meet certain criteria and issue building permits for housing developments consisting of newly constructed housing units that are affordable to low- or very low-income households.

As currently amended, the bill relates to the Statewide Park Development and Community Revitalization Act of 2007 and specifies the procedure and criteria for awarding Prop. 84 grants.

Status: Senate Floor.

Amended: 9/7.

City Position: Support with Amendments.

AB 1253 (Caballero) – Salinas Valley State Prison Wastewater Treatment Plant (Gut and amended on 9/7 – previously related to Prop. 84: Sustainable Communities and Greening: Grant Programs).

The previous version of the bill created the Sustainable Communities and Urban Greening Fund and the Integrated Sustainable Planning Implementation Council to develop and administer programs to award grants and loans to improve the sustainability and livability of communities through development of green infrastructure. Required the council to create the Planning Revolving Loan Program for the purpose of distributing the \$180 million in Prop. 84 funds to eligible planning projects to encourage the development of regional and local land use plans that are designed to promote water conservation, reduce automobile use and fuel consumption, encourage greater infill and compact development, protect natural resources and agricultural lands, and revitalize urban and community centers. Included \$90 million for planning grants, incentives and loans, and \$90 million for grants for urban greening projects.

As currently amended, the bill makes legislative findings and declarations relating to the wastewater treatment situation in the City of Soledad and the Salinas Valley State Prison.

AB 1254 (Caballero) – Property Tax Revenue Allocations.

Requires the county auditor to reduce the total amount of ad valorem property tax revenue otherwise required to be allocated to the county Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) by the countywide affordable housing amount, and to increase the amount of ad valorem property tax revenue otherwise required to be allocated to a qualified local agency, by that agency's affordable housing amount.

Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee on 5/31.

Amended: N/A.

AB 1430 (Garrick) – Political Reform Act of 1974: Contributions.

Amends the Political Reform Act of 1974 to provide that certain restrictions and limitations by a local jurisdiction on payments for a member communication by a political party conflict with provisions of that act and would be prohibited.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 5/8.

City Position: Oppose.

AB 1460 (Saldana) – Multifamily Housing Program: Project Prioritization.

Requires the Department of Housing and Community Development to award reasonable priority points for projects to prioritize sustainable building methods established in accordance with certain criteria listed under state regulations relating to federal and state low-income housing tax credits.

Status: Governor Desk.

Amended: 8/27.

City Position: Support.

AB 1489 (Huffman) – Prop. 84: Resource Bond Funds: Regional Water Management Plans.

Relates to the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Bond Act of 2006. Declares legislative intent to implement Prop. 84, which provides \$5.4 billion, in an integrated manner that increases public benefit, reduces greenhouse gas emissions to the extent feasible, improves adaptability to predicted climate change impacts, and provides tangible benefits to disadvantaged communities whenever possible. Requires the Department of Public Health to provide grants to regional water quality control boards to identify sources of groundwater contamination, develop a plan to achieve drinking water quality objectives relating to groundwater, and identify funding priorities for groundwater grants. Requires the Department of Water Resources to provide grants to local public agencies for the development and implementation of integrated regional water management plans with broad and diverse participation.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee Suspense File.

Amended: 8/20.

AB 1542 (Evans) – Mobilehome Parks: Conversions.

Relates to a map for a subdivision to be created from the conversion of a rental mobilehome park to resident ownership. Requires local rent control measures to remain applicable to spaces within the park. Requires the legislative body that is authorized to approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove the map, to require the subdivider to take steps to mitigate any adverse impact of the conversion on the ability of displaced mobilehome park residents to find adequate space in a mobilehome park.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 6/5.

City Position: Support.

AB 1719 (Hancock) – Recycling: Beverage Containers: Plastic Bags.

Extends for one year a provision in existing law to utilize unredeemed funds to cover processing payments for any container type with a recycling rate of 45% or higher (saves beverage producers \$25 million in processing fees for 2008). Provides one-year funding expenditures for beverage container recycling and litter cleanup: increases curbside payments by \$5 million; increases nonprofit and school grants by \$500,000; increases Department Market Development grant authority by \$4 million; extends \$5 million in multifamily recycling grants through 2008; establishes a new, one-year \$10 million grant fund for local and public agencies for beverage container marine debris cleanup and prevention; and establishes a new, one-year \$5 million grant fund for public agencies or nonprofit organizations for environmental education initiatives. Suspends for two years (2007 and 2008 certification years), CIWMB enforcement of the recycled content requirements for plastic trash bags and disposal reduction targets for reducing the disposal of plastic in the state's waste stream. Clarifies eligibility for handling fees for nonprofit recycling centers whose existence allows for the exemption of the supermarket recycle center mandate.

Amended: 9/11.

ACA 8 (De La Torre) – Eminent Domain.

Proposes an amendment to the Constitution to prohibit state and local governments from acquiring by eminent domain an owner-occupied residence, real property on which a small business is operated, real property that is used exclusively by the owner for religious worship and is exempt from property taxes, or real property in agricultural use, for the purpose of conveying that property to a private person. Provides that the previous owner may reacquire property not used for a public purpose. Provides assessment and reacquisition procedures.

Status: Failed Assembly Floor on 9/11.

Amended: 9/6.

City Position: Watch (See also AB 887).

SB 2 (Cedillo) – Local Planning: Emergency Shelters By-Right.

Requires cities and counties to pre-zone sites for emergency shelters and allow them "by right," without a conditional use permit or other discretionary permits. Requires cities and counties to treat transitional and supportive housing projects as a residential use of property.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 8/31.

City Position: Oppose.

SB 46 (Perata) – Proposition 1C: Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account.

Provides statutory framework for expenditure of \$850 million in the Regional Planning, Housing and Infill Incentive Account. Authorizes bonds to finance various existing housing programs, capital outlay related to infill development, brownfield cleanup that promotes infill development, and housing-related parks. Establishes a competitive grant program for infill housing development and infrastructure needs. Establishes a competitive grant program for infill housing development and infrastructure needs. Requires the Pollution Control Financing Authority to allocate funds to infill projects. Funding is subject to State budget appropriation.

SB 49 (Migden) – Local Government: Financial Assistance: Sports Franchises.

Prohibits a local agency or redevelopment agency from providing financial assistance to a sports stadium project that involves the relocation of a professional sports franchise from the territorial jurisdiction of one local agency to another within the same market area. Provides that this prohibition does not apply to local agency financial assistance in the construction of public improvements that serve all or a portion of the jurisdiction of the local agency.

Status: Senate Committee on Local Government.

Amended: 2/22.

City Position: Oppose.

SB 103 (Cedillo) – Economic Development Subsidies: Review by Local Agency.

Requires each local agency to provide specified information to the public before approving an economic development subsidy that include loans, grants, loan guarantees, tax increment financing, tax abatements, tax exemptions, and tax credits within its jurisdiction, and to review, hold hearings and report on those subsidies at specified intervals.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 8/31.

SB 184 (Alquist) – Transportation Projects.

Limits provisions of existing law that authorize a regional or local entity that sponsors, or is eligible to receive funding for, a project contained in the State Transportation Improvement Program to expend its own funds for any component of a project within its jurisdiction that is included in an adopted program, and for which the CA Transportation Commission has not made an allocation to projects advanced for expenditure by an eligible entity. Provides a deadline for allocation requests.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 7/9.

City Position: Support.

SB 264 (Alquist) – Transactions and Use Taxes: Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority.

Authorizes the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority, if approved by 2/3 vote of the electorate, to adopt an ordinance to impose a transactions and use tax at a rate of 0.125 (1/8 cent), or a multiple thereof, for transit facilities and services. Limits the combined rate of all district taxes imposed in any county to 2%.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 8/27.

City Position: Support.

SB 275 (Cedillo) – Health Facilities: Patient Transporting.

Prohibits a general acute care hospital, acute psychiatric hospital or special hospital from causing a patient to be transported to a location other than the residence of the patient without the written consent of the patient, except when a patient is lawfully transferred to another health facility. Makes a violation subject to civil penalties, which would be used for transitional housing and mental health counseling for the homeless.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/7.

City Position: Support with Amendments.

SB 286 (Lowenthal/ Dutton) – Prop. 1B: Transportation Bonds: Implementation (see AB 196).

Requires the first payments of Proposition 1B \$2 billion in funds for the Local Streets and Road programs to be allocated by the Controller. Requires the Controller to use certain population figures in making allocations to cities. Requires an applicant for funds to submit a list of projects expected to be funded to the Department of Transportation. Requires the funds to be allocated within three fiscal years of the date of the allocation, and requires return of unallocated funds. The State Budget includes \$950 million in 2007-08, with \$550 million for cities and \$400 million for counties. The City of San Jose is estimated to receive \$15.7 million in 2007-08.

Status: Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

Amended: 7/16.

City Position: Support.

SB 303 (Ducheny) – Local Government: Land Use Planning.

Requires each county or city general plan to encompass a specified planning and projection period of at least 20 years, except for the housing, conservation and open-space elements which would be updated at least every 10 years.

Status: Assembly Committee on Local Government.

Amended: 6/25.

SB 372 (Steinberg) – High-Speed Rail: Educational and Vocational Training.

Requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to prepare, in conjunction with the High-Speed Rail Authority, an inventory of future educational and vocational courses necessary for the high-speed train project, and to develop courses of study necessary to meet the need for skills associated with building and operating the project. Specifies that the bill would not be operative until the date of the election in which the Safe, Reliable High-Speed Passenger Train Act is approved by the voters.

Status: Held in Senate Appropriations Committee Suspense File.

Amended: 5/24.

SB 375 (Steinberg) – Transportation Planning: Travel Models: Sustainable Communities Strategy: Environmental Review.

Relates to travel demand guidelines used in regional transportation plans, the requirement that a regional transportation plan include a sustainable communities strategy, designed to achieve goals and target dates for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks in the region. Requires an environmental document under CEQA that examines specific impacts of a transportation project located in a local jurisdiction that has amended its general plan and the legislative body finds the project meets specified criteria.

Status: Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

Amended: 9/12.

City Position: Oppose.

SB 378 (Steinberg) – Prop. 1E: Disaster Preparedness and Flood Prevention.

Requires the Department of Water Resources, when evaluating levees and facilities, to include an evaluation of the risk of the levees and facilities due to a seismic event and to give priority to projects that would reduce the risk of flooding and the needs of disadvantaged communities. Requires bond funds grant programs for existing and new levees that are part of the state plan of flood control to comply with specified requirements. Funding is subject to State budget appropriation.

Status: Assembly Committee on Water, Parks and Wildlife.

Amended: 6/4.

SB 465 (Lowenthal) – Prop. 1C: Housing: Grant and Loan Programs.

Expands the definition of "eligible applicant" for purposes of the Infill Incentive Grant Program of 2007 to include an owners' association for a business or property improvement district that includes a qualifying infill area, jointly with a city, county, city and county, public housing authority, or redevelopment agency. Requires HCD to make loans for the development and construction of housing developments that are located within ½ mile of a transit station by way of a readily walkable route.

Status: Assembly Floor.

Amended: 9/11.

SB 586 (Dutton) – Prop. 1C: Affordable Housing Innovation Fund.

Allocates the \$100 million Affordable Housing Innovation Fund created by Prop. 1C. Provides \$50 million for the Revolving Development and Acquisition Program; \$35 million for the Local Housing Trust matching grant program; \$10 million for the Innovative Homeownership Program; and \$5 million for the Construction Liability Insurance Reform Pilot Program. Funding is subject to State budget appropriation.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/7.

City Position: Oppose Unless Amended.

SB 641 (Corbett) – Vehicle Rental Agreements: San Jose Airport.

Repeals Section 1936.5 of the Civil Code, which specifically authorizes San Jose International Airport to design and construct a consolidated rental car facility and/or a common use transportation system, subject to specified cost restrictions, and permits the San Jose International Airport to collect a separate, unbundled fee of up to \$10.15 per rental transaction to recoup its design, construction, and financing costs upon the commencement of operations of the consolidated facility.

Status: Chapter 44, Statutes of 2007 (signed by Governor 7/12).

Amended: N/A.

City Position: Sponsor/ Support.

SB 725 (Alquist) – Agnews Developmental Center Closure: Outpatient Clinic.

Requires the Department of Developmental Services to continue to provide specialized health and dental services available through the outpatient clinic at Agnews Developmental Center after the center is closed, until the department is no longer responsible for the property. Provides for an orderly transition.

Status: Held in Assembly Appropriations Committee on 8/30.

Amended: 7/5.

SB 732 (Steinberg) – Prop. 84: Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act of 2006.

Requires state departments that are to implement the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality and Supply, Flood Control, River and Coastal Protection Bond Act to develop and adopt guidelines and regulations. Provides \$580 million in Prop. 84 funds for nature education and research facilities, reports regarding grant recipients, investor-owned utilities, and the funding of integrated regional water management plan projects or programs. Creates the Sustainable Communities Council and Fund to align transportation funds with regional strategies to reduce vehicular miles traveled and reliance on automobile use. Funding is subject to State budget appropriation.

Status: Assembly Floor Inactive File.

SB 748 (Corbett) – Transportation: State-Local Partnerships.

Requires the CA Transportation Commission to adopt guidelines for the expenditure of \$1 billion in State-Local Partnership Program funds. Defines eligible local matching funds under the program for purposes of the required dollar-for-dollar match. Establishes an application procedure to nominate projects. Limits the amount of funding for a single project in a funding cycle. Describes the categories or projects that may be funded through the program. Establishes timelines for expenditure of funds.

Status: Assembly Committee on Appropriations Suspense File.

Amended: 7/12.

City Position: Support with Amendments.

SB 966 (Simitian) – Pharmaceutical Drug Disposal.

Requires the Integrated Waste Management Board to identify and develop model programs for the safe disposal of pharmaceutical waste. Requires the board to report to the Legislature by December 1, 2010, on the efficacy, safety and cost-effectiveness of the program, as well as the potential for replicating model programs statewide. Increases from \$5 million to \$6 million the amount of funding the board is authorized to award grants to cities, counties and other local agencies for a variety of solid waste management and hazardous waste disposal activities. The requirement that the board develop model programs would sunset January 1, 2013.

SB 976 (Torlakson) – San Francisco Bay Area Water Emergency Transportation Authority.

Repeals the San Francisco Bay Area Water Transit Authority (WTA) and, instead, establishes the San Francisco Bay Area Water Emergency Transportation Authority (WETA) to coordinate the emergency activities of all water transportation and related facilities within the region. Requires the transfer of all current WTA assets, including public transportation ferries and related water transportation services and facilities, to the WETA.

Status: Governor's Desk.

SB 1002 (Perata) – Prop. 1E & Prop. 84: Water Quality, Flood Control, Water Storage, and Wildlife Preservation.

Appropriates \$610.9 million in Prop. 1E and Prop. 84 bond funding for a variety of programs relating to flood management, groundwater recharge, drinking water quality, water recycling and conservation, and water contaminant and salt removal technologies. Funding is subject to State budget appropriation.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/6.

City Position: Pending.

SB 1020 (Padilla) – Solid Waste: Diversion.

Requires the State Integrated Waste Management Board to develop a strategic and comprehensive plan to achieve, on or before January 1, 2020, a diversion of solid waste statewide from landfill disposal or transformation. Requires the board to adopt policies and incentives to ensure that, on or before December 12, 2012, 60% of all solid waste generation in the state is source reduced, recycled or composted, and to ensure that, on or before January 1, 2020, 75% of all solid waste generated is source reduced, recycled or composted.

Status: Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

Amended: 6/26.

City Position: Support.

SB 1021 (Padilla) – Beverage Containers: Grants.

Authorizes the Department of Conservation to expend \$15 million between January 1, 2008, to January 1, 2009, to provide grants to place source separated beverage container recycling receptacles in multifamily housing. Provides the department with \$198,000 from the Beverage Container Recycling Fund for one-time administrative costs to implement this grant program.

Status: Governor's Desk.

Amended: 9/7.

City Position: Support.




