

## ATTACHMENT A

### DOT AND SJPD SAFETY PROGRAMS

1. DOT School Safety Program Manager – Full-time person, dedicated to school safety issues. Functions as a single point of contact for school districts with traffic, pedestrian and other transportation issues. Functions as staff for School Safety Pedestrian Committee. Works with City Engineers, SJPD, parents, and school officials to resolve pick-up and drop-off issues, school bus issues, signs, and pavement marking issues.
2. School Safety Education – pedestrian and bicycle safety education seminars at 50% of K-8 schools annually. Provided by Safe Moves until January 31, 2004. DOT and SJPD are currently exploring options, including grant funding to provide the service in-house, in coordination with the Street Smarts Program, below.
3. Street Smarts Campaign – launched in Nov. 2002 as a media and community relations campaign. This program will be the “parent” program to other school safety education programs. Street Smarts is being rolled out to schools and neighborhoods and has received widespread regional support from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), VTA, Caltrans, AAA, and the CHP, as well as numerous other cities. The program has provided classroom safety posters, fence banners, parent education seminars, and other educational materials to San José schools.
4. School Access Enhancement Study - Completed 1<sup>st</sup> phase (42 schools). Evaluated school drop off/pick-up conditions to reduce traffic congestion, provide a more pedestrian-friendly environment, optimize existing facilities, and to expand pedestrian education to parents, educators, and students. Continuation of this program is on hold, pending further funding.
5. School Walking Route Maps – DOT provides schools with walking route maps as an educational tool. They are also included as handouts in the School Safety Education Program. Route maps also provide a tool for City engineers to identify areas in need of physical improvements.
6. Pavement Embedded Crosswalk Lights – Contract awarded and construction to begin in March 2004 for 10 school crossing locations.
7. Automated Speed Radar Display Sign – 31 Signs have been installed and are operational. Currently evaluating effectiveness of signs, for required study by Caltrans.
8. School Pedestrian Safety Committee – This is an advisory committee, comprised of school district representatives and community members, which reviews and develops recommendations for adult crossing guard placement, school safety patrols, and other school safety issues.
9. City/Schools Collaborative – This partnership, managed by PRNS, is a forum to discuss on-going issues, such as land-use, after-school programs, and other issues common to both the City and school districts. DOT will continue involvement with the Collaborative, to provide advice on safety and transportation related matters.

10. Operation Safe Passage – Countywide effort coordinated by the CHP. Involves 13 law enforcement agencies, including SJPD, targeting enforcement of regulations in school zones. Occurs three times per year.
11. Sober Graduation – SJPD participates in this county-wide effort, and works with the CHP to provide education outreach aimed at high school seniors. Includes mock DUI arrests, trials, jail, probation, etc., and also presentations by traffic officers at school assemblies.
12. Every 15 Minutes – This is a two-day SJPD program that is aimed at high school juniors and seniors. The first day's program includes a mock DUI fatal accident scene re-created on campus. This is reinforced by the removal of students from classrooms through-out the day at 15 minute intervals, symbolizing how many people are killed each day in DUI related crashes. The second day involves assemblies that are conducted as a funeral for those "victims" that were removed from class the previous day. Features guest speakers, and parents of actual victims. This program is conducted in the spring, usually just before graduation.
13. Operation Lifesaver – Education outreach coordinated by the County, and presented by SJPD and Rail officials for elementary students. Includes safety demonstrations on the use of buses, trains, Light Rail, bicycles, and pedestrian travel.
14. Officer MAC Presentations – Robotic interactive program delivered by SJPD is an education outreach presentation aimed at elementary students and offered to schools upon request. Involves presentations about traffic and personal safety.
15. Officer Bill Presentations – Similar to Officer MAC presentations, but conducted by a uniformed officer, rather than a robot.
16. Child Safety Seat Inspection – San José Police Dept. participates in conjunction with Stanford Children's Hospital in 10 safety seat inspection events annually. For calendar year 2003, 630 child safety seats were checked and 163 seats given away through vouchers, 45 of which were at Safe Kids events. In 2004, to date, 76 have been inspected. If funding for this program is reduced, however, staff might not be available to support this program.
17. SJPD School Safety and Education Unit – responsible for recruiting and training school crossing guards, coordinates with schools to train and monitor Student Safety Patrols, and conducts school safety presentations on pedestrian and bicycle safety upon request. Pedestrian and bicycle presentations use robots "Maggie" or "Mikey" (Bike-Bots) to deliver this message.
