1. Develop a "proper" master plan, taking into view what the majority of people really want rather than what has already been perceived by a some in government. Examples are: the Alviso Master Plan- 7 years plan accomplished with much community and S.J. city planning department participation, and the Alviso Marina Master Plan, a 3 year community plan done with much community participation as well. One need only to talk to people today about this. Alviso is located westerly from Highway 237, at the tail end of this proposed North 1st Street Proposal, Pop. 2000. Quoted recently by a Lc. P.E., "Alviso is surrounded by Silicon Valley, but yet retains it retains the peacefulness." To me, this is an example of what can be done successfully with people participation since this was one of the main goals of the master plans.

2. Suggestion- Allow North 1st St. developments to evolve to the greatness they once had- encourage new industry- use the monies put into redevelopment to work accordingly- find a solution-not a mandate. Allow all segments of society to have the opportunity for a "job", not just for the elite. We are not like other nations. That's what makes America great! I have personally along with others made note that industry is returning to our North 1st St. having counted 16-20 new company signage in the past year and a half.

3. Establish improved flood control measures for the Lower Guadalupe River before adding more discharge waters from vast numbers of heavy density housing, 40-50 /ac. The Alviso community is adjacent to the Lower Guadalupe River and has not been considered in the present developmental proposals as to what effect they will have due to more water being put into this river. It has been said in defense of that, that the surface water would be lessened due the added height of the of the newly proposed buildings. I do not believe that would be the case Alviso, Lower Guadalupe, has no flood control improvement plan on the books and bond monies are presently not sufficient to complete the listed flood control projects now in progress. A historic town, ca 1849, like Alviso should not be destroyed in the process of eager development due to flooding. One need only to talk to the indigenous at the time of the 1983 flood. Toxins that run off pose another serious concern to our water ways.

4. Not a vast network of heavy density housing for people. Presently 9000 new residential have been approved by the City of San Jose planning departments without people approval. My personal discussions with people indicate no approval. Opinions are that this is not how people want to live and spend there lives here. We are not a foreign country, we have resources to give people the quality of life in Santa Clara County. We do not have regulated birth rates. People with children need schools, and recreation for their children. They also need additional places to park their cars- 1.5 parking spots purposed with heavy density living will limit their freedoms and street

parking will increase as it does today with added traffic congestion- see examples of this in photos forwarded on meeting #5.

5. Reduce transit operation since 4 cars have continually been observed carrying the max. of 4 passengers + at various different hours of the day. No numbers have been given when asked in public forums about usage. See photos submitted showing poor occupancy. The majority of people spoken to do not intend to give up their cars due to the many various out of town job locations etc. This also includes families of the many extended families from far and wide that live here. Reducing present transit operations will also serve to save power. If and when needed, it could be restored.

6. We need to be that we have a sustainable water supply if an increase of 32,000 residences are in the planning of North 1st. A better and more thorough understanding of the Hetch Hetchy water supply needs to happen prior to any and all new large developments. Recycled water should be used in any new industry which should be continually encouraged. Use solar power in all landscaping where feasible instead of electrical power.

7. Reuse presently already constructed industrial buildings for new industry rather than destroying them for heavy housing developments. Encourage creative reconstruction using original materials. Think renewable!, Think green!, Save our Planet! This in my opinion needs to be seriously addressed before destruction occurs in any and all present existing commercial buildings. Our older and large trees should not be destroyed in lieu of heavy density housing. Examples are the many beautiful 50 feet +/- palms presently growing on Zanker Road at the Sony building, and the 30 + acre grove of orange trees, The Moitozo Ranch, presently growing on River Oaks.

8. Traffic congestion in Santa Clara County is #4 poor in California. In my opinion, and in the opinion of many others, we must not do projects that encourage traffic since the transit system does not meet the needs of people now, and people do and will continue to enjoy and rely on their cars to move them to the many recreational spots for work, and play. I do not believe that small parks will resolve mankind's need to explore new places and things. Reducing mans mobility should not be a goal. See photographs submitted of the 2,500 acre Wildlife Refuge vastly uses for viewing and recreation that allows people the freedom to explore and move about. The refuge was established in the seventies by the former Congressman Don Edwards, and community leaders such as North San Jose Task Force member, Dr. Bob Gross Ph.D.

In conclusion, I feel that any and all new projects that are planned for the North San Jose Vision concepts should be brought first before the task force prior to the planning stage approval, since presently projects that have been approved lacked people input, and involvement, even though it had been approved by the San Jose City Council in 2004. Councilmember, Vice Mayor Dave Cortese advised the public recently, that no master plan had ever beer done prior to its adoption.

Dear Ms. Price,

General Order 159-A (GO-159-A) of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requires cellular carriers to send a notification letter of a utility's intent to construct a cellular facility to CPUC's Safety and Enforcement Division within 15 business days of receipt of all requisite local land use approvals. 




