

AB 3 (V. Perez) Renewable Energy Workforce Readiness Program.	Requires the Public Utilities Commission to establish a Renewable Energy Workforce Readiness Program to ensure green collar career placement and advancement opportunities. AB 19 (Ruskin) Greenhouse Gas Emissions: Consumer Product Labeling.	Enacts the Carbon Labeling Act of 2009 to require the Air Resources Board to develop and implement a program for the voluntary assessment, verification and standardized labeling of the carbon footprint of consumer products sold in this state. AB 44 (Blakeslee) Energy Storage Facilities.	Authorizes the Public Utilities Commission to approve an increase in the rate of return for investment by a corporation in energy storage facilities that meet specified requirements. AB 45 (Blakeslee) Distributed Generation: Small Wind Energy Systems.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to encourage local agencies to support the state's renewable energy procurement requirements by developing and adopting ordinances that facilitate the installation of distributed small wind energy systems. AB 46 (Blakeslee) Energy Conservation Assistance.	Extends for an additional nine years, until January 1, 2020, the time that the CA Energy Commission may administer and deposit federal economic stimulus funds into the State Energy Conservation Assistance Account and the Local Jurisdiction Energy Assistance Account, for the purpose of providing grants and loans to local governments and public institutions to maximize energy use savings. AB 49 (Feuer) Water Conservation: Urban Water Use.	Requires the state to achieve a 20% reduction in its urban per capita water use by December 31, 2020.	Yes	Assembly Committee on Water, Parks and Wildlife.
AB 64 (Krekorian) Renewable Energy Resources: Generation and Transmission.	Recasts the Renewables Portfolio Standard Program, effective January 1, 2011, to require a retail seller and a local publicly owned electric utility to procure the electricity delivered to its retail customers from eligible renewable energy resources, as follows: 20% by December 31, 2010; 25% by December 31, 2015; 35% by December 31, 2020; and at least 50% by December 31, 2035. AB 68 (Brownley) Solid Waste: Single- Use Carryout Bags.	Effective July 1, 2011, requires stores to charge customers at least \$0.25 per single-use carryout bag at the point of sale. Stores may retain 5-10 cents per bag and remit the balance to the State Board of Equalization for deposit in the Bag Pollution Fund. AB 87 (Davis) Single-Use Carryout Bags: Environmental Effects: Mitigation.	Effective July 1, 2010, requires stores to charge customers at least \$0.25 per single-use or green carryout bag at the point of sale. Stores may retain 5-7 cents per bag and remit the balance to the State Board of Equalization for deposit in the Bag Pollution Fund. Not more than 5% of the proceeds would be used to established state clean-up, education and outreach programs. AB 96 (Ruskin) Gasoline: Underground Storage Tanks. Provides that the operator, who is not necessarily the owner, his/her family, or affiliated entity are eligible for the grant program. AB 210 (Hayashi) Green Building Standards.	Specifies that the requirements and regulations that a city or county is authorized to change or modify building standards includes, but is not limited to, green building standards.	No	Assembly Committee on Business and Professions.
AB 212 (Saldana) Energy: Building Standards: Zero Net Energy Buildings.	Requires the Energy Commission to adopt building design and construction standards and energy and water conservation standards to require new residential construction on a date by which the commission determines that the use of photovoltaic technology is cost-effective, to be zero net energy buildings. AB 234 (Huffman) Energy: Efficiency.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to develop an implementation plan for distributing federal economic stimulus dollars for energy efficiency projects and programs to help facilitate the state's economic recovery, while making investments in the state's environment and improvements to Californians' quality of life. AB 238 (Adams) Renewable Energy Resources.	Revises legislative findings and declarations to declare that new and modified electric transmission facilities, including the employment of smart grid technologies, may be necessary to facilitate the state's achievement of its energy efficiency goals and renewables portfolio standard targets. AB 262 (Bass) American Recovery and Reinvestment Plan: Energy.	Requires any moneys received by the state pursuant to the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Plan that are directed for energy-related activities, programs or projects to be administered by the state's energy and water agencies, and to adhere to the principle of accountability while also adhering to existing state policies to promote energy efficiency, water conservation, renewable energy, and green job training. AB 274 (Portantino) Solid Waste: Landfills: Closure Plans.	Prohibits the owner or operator of a closed solid waste landfill that is subject to a closure or postclosure maintenance plan from selling or offering for sale any portion of a closed waste management unit unless the intended purchase provides evidence of his or her ability to meet the financial assurance requirements of the Integrated Waste Management Act. AB 283 (Chesbro) Solid Waste: Extended Producer Responsibility Program.	Establishes the California Product Stewardship Act of 2010, administered by the CA Integrated Waste Management Board by regulations adopted by July 1, 2011, to provide environmentally sound product stewardship protocols that encourage producers of solid waste to research alternatives during the product design and packaging phases to foster cradle-to-cradle producer responsibility and reduce the end-of-life environmental impacts of the product. Effective July 1, 2012, prohibits covered products from being sold or used for promotional purposes unless the producer submits a product stewardship plan to the board. AB 289 (Galgiani) Public Resources: Geothermal Resources: Disposition.	Makes technical changes to existing law which allocates revenues, distributed to the state by the federal government resulting from statutory activities of certain agencies with regard to the development of geothermal resources. AB 290 (Davis) Neighborhood Stabilization Program Grants.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that directs a portion of the federal Neighborhood Stabilization Program's funding to accomplish specified objectives relating to the building and green collar trades, the provision of affordable, energy efficient housing, and the revitalization of low to moderate-income areas.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 300 (Caballero) Subdivisions: Water Supply.	Requires the legislative body of a city or county or the designated advisory agency to approve or disapprove a housing subdivider's water savings projections attributable to voluntary demand management measures, after being reviewed by the retail water supplier and verified for accuracy. Requires any city, county or public water system preparing a water supply assessment to reduce the projected water demand for the project to an amount below the current statutory requirements. AB 310 (Price) Employment: Green Workforce Partnership Program.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to establish a pilot program, known as the Green Workforce Partnership Demonstration Program, to develop workers for employment in green industries and environmentally sustainable business activities. AB 380 (DeLaTorre) Clean Energy Curriculum and Training Initiative.	Creates the Clean Energy Curriculum and Training Initiative of 2009 to establish standardized curriculum for use at schools and provide outreach, assistance and guidance to schools for creating clean energy training programs. Revises the PUC order to electrical corporations that have collected monies for research and development.	Yes	Assembly Committee on Utilities and Commerce.
AB 394 (Fuentes) Solar Energy Systems.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to further facilitate the efforts of local publicly owned electric utilities to increase the installation of residential and commercial solar energy systems.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 408 (Saldana) Local Planning: Water Supplies.	Requires a city or county to notify the Regional Water Quality Control Board servicing the area before adopting or amending its general plan. Requires the board to provide the planning agency with certain information regarding implementation of low-impact development water management to increase local water supplies by increasing stormwater recharge and reuse. AB 410 (DeLaTorre) Proposition 84: Integrated Regional Water Management Planning.	Provides that \$5 million in Proposition 84 bond funds shall be made available to the Department of Water Resources for allocation to specified regions for the preparation of salt and nutrient management plans consistent with the recycled water policy of the State Water Resources Control Board. AB 419 (Caballero) Joint Powers Agreements: Water Utilities.	Authorizes a water utility that is regulated by the Public Utility Commission to enter into a joint powers agreement with one or more public agencies and other water suppliers, if the purpose of the joint powers agreement pertains to regional or local water management. AB 460 (Anderson) Water Resources: Salinity: Water Softeners.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would require new residential water softening equipment sold in the state to have a minimum salt efficiency rating of no less than 4,400 grains of hardness removed per pound of salt used in regeneration, and to enact legislation that would achieve a 20% reduction in the per capita use of salt in water softening equipment. AB 466 (Coto) Santa Clara Valley Water District.	Revises the composition of the Santa Clara Valley Water District board, and requires the board to review its financial reserves and adopt a resolution establishing the district's boundaries.	Yes	Assembly Committee on Local Government.
AB 473 (Blumenfield) Solid Waste: Multifamily Dwellings.	Requires an owner of a multifamily dwelling to arrange for recycling services that are appropriate for the multifamily dwelling, consistent with state or local laws or requirements, including a local ordinance or agreement, applicable to the collection, handling, or recycling of solid waste. AB 474 (Blumenfield) Contractual Assessments: Water Efficiency Improvements.	Authorizes the legislative body of any public agency to determine that it would be in the public interest to designate an area within which authorized city officials and free and willing property owners may enter into contractual assessments to finance the installation of water efficiency improvements and the installation of distributed generation renewable energy sources or energy efficiency improvements that are permanently fixed to real property. These improvements would not be considered new construction for property tax purposes.	No	Assembly Committee on Local Government.
AB 479 (Chesbro) Solid Waste Diversion.	Effective January 1, 2015, requires cities and counties to divert 60% of all solid waste through source reduction, recycling and composting activities. Requires local agencies to adopt a commercial recycling ordinance by January 1, 2011, to require businesses that contract for solid waste services and generate more than four cubic yards of total solid waste and recyclable materials per week to arrange for recycling service. Requires solid waste disposal facilities to pay a quarterly fee of up to \$1.40 per ton to the State Board of Equalization, based on the amount of all solid waste disposed of at each disposal site. AB 560 (Skinner) Net Energy Metering.	Requires that the standard contract or tariff for net energy metering be offered on a first-come first-served basis until the time that the total rated generating capacity used by customer-generators exceeds an unspecified percentage of the electric distribution utility or cooperative's peak demand. AB 626 (Eng) Regional Water Management Planning.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to maximize the expenditure of Proposition 84 bond funds on behalf of disadvantaged communities for projects to meet long-term water needs pursuant to integrated regional water management plans. AB 739 (Fuller) Energy: Wind Energy.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to encourage the use and siting of wind energy facilities.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 828 (Lieu) Green Building Standards.	Revises the CA Building Standards Commission's requirement to adopt, approve, codify, update, and publish green building standards from a state agency. Authorizes any state agency to propose to the commission mandatory green building standards in their area of expertise. Requires that approved green building standards be inserted into the Building Standards Code. Requires the Energy Commission to develop and adopt voluntary energy efficiency or water efficiency standards.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.

AB 887 (Krekorian) Energy.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to address the impediments to the siting of facilities that produce electricity from renewable sources of energy, and the placement and construction of transmission infrastructure necessary to allow that electricity to be consumed by California taxpayers. AB 920 (Huffman) Solar and Wind Distributed Generation.	Revises provisions of the Public Utilities Act regarding electric utilities and solar and wind distributed generation, standard contracts and tariffs between the utility and customer-generators, and net energy surpluses counting toward the utility's renewables portfolio standard purchasing requirements. AB 935 (Feuer) Nanomaterials.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to address emerging toxicity issues surrounding the increasingly widespread utilization of engineered nanomaterials.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1023 (Ruskin) Renewable Energy Resources.	Requires electric generation facilities to file a standard tariff with the Public Utilities Commission for electricity generated and have an effective capacity of not more than 20 megawatts, rather than the current 1.5 megawatts, and be located on property owned or under the control of the customer. AB 1027 (Blumenfeld) Energy: Solar Energy.	Requires the Energy Commission to establish a solar schools and nonprofits program to encourage schools, hospitals and specified nonprofit public benefit corporations to install solar energy systems.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1043 (Fong) Biofuels.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to advance biofuels and other clean fuel technologies.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1061 (Lieu) Common Interest Developments: Water Efficient Landscape.	Provides that any of the governing documents of a common interest development shall be void and unenforceable if it prohibits, or includes conditions that have the effect of prohibiting, the use of low water-using plants as a group, or has the effect of prohibiting or restricting compliance with a local water efficient landscape ordinance or water conservation measure.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1106 (Fuentes) Renewable Electric Generation Facilities: Tariffs.	Requires every electrical corporation to file a standard feed-in tariff with the Public Utilities Commission for the electricity generated by a renewable electric generation facility and make the feed-in tariff available to any customer of the electrical corporation, upon request, on a first-come, first-served basis, until the electrical corporation meets its renewables portfolio standard. Provides that the electricity generated by the renewable electric generation facility, including generation used to offset the customer's own usage of electricity, counts toward the electrical corporation's renewables portfolio standard and resource adequacy requirements. Authorizes a customer receiving electrical service pursuant to an alternative net metering program to elect to receive service pursuant to the feed-in tariff by waiving any right the customer otherwise has to thereafter receive service under an alternative net metering program. AB 1111 (Blakeslee) CA Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority.	Provides that financial assistance granted by the CAEATFA to certain entities for projects to generate new and renewable energy sources and develop clean and efficient distributed generation, may be used for machinery or equipment utilized for the design, technology transfer, manufacture, production, assembly, distribution, or service of an alternative source component. AB 1141 (Calderon) Carryout Bags.	Effective July 1, 2011, requires manufacturers or distributors of single-use carryout bags to pay an extended producer responsibility fee for each bag it sells directly or indirectly to a store. Requires the CA Integrated Waste Management Board to establish a 50% single-use carryout bag reduction goal by 2014, using 2010 as an initial baseline. Extends for an additional four years, until January 1, 2017, the CIWMB program that requires store operators to establish at-store recycling programs allowing customers to return clean plastic carryout bags. Effective January 1, 2017, requires manufacturers or distributors of plastic carryout bags to make arrangements with store operators for the collection, transport and recycling of plastic carryout bags and other film plastic. AB 1187 (Huffman) Safe, Clean, Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010.	Enacts the Safe, Clean, Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2010 which would authorize, for the purposes of financing specified water supply reliability and water source protection programs, the issuance of general obligations bonds in the amount of \$10 billion. AB 1212 (Ruskin) Air Resources: Clean Vehicle Incentive Program.	Authorizes the State Air Resources Board to adopt and implement a clean vehicle incentive or rebate program consisting of one-time rebates and surcharges on the sale of new passenger motor vehicles, and a clean vehicle incentive program to achieve equivalent or greater emission reductions of greenhouse gases from mobile sources.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1366 (Feuer) Residential Self- Regenerating Water Softeners.	Authorizes any local agency that maintains a community sewer system to take action, by ordinance or resolution after a public meeting, to control salinity inputs from residential self-regenerating water softeners, if the regional water board finds that the control of residential salinity input will protect the quality of water in California.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1394 (Bass) CA Workforce Investment Board: Green Jobs.	Authorizes the Green Collar Jobs Council to accept any revenues, moneys, grants, goods, or services from federal and state governmental entities and other sources, to be used for purposes relating to the administration and implementation of its strategic initiative.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1408 (Krekorian) Subdivisions: Water Conservation Mitigation Fund.	Establishes a Water Conservation Mitigation Fund to be administered by a public water system. Requires a legislative body of a city or county or the advisory agency, to the extent that it is authorized by local ordinance to approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove the tentative map, include as a condition in any tentative map that includes a subdivision a requirement that the subdivision have a sufficient water supply be available or that sufficient water supplies will be made available through a Water Conservation Mitigation Fund held by the public water system. AB 1508 (Torrico) School Facilities: Solar Energy.	Declares the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would encourage school districts to include solar energy in their projects for the modernization and new construction of school facilities.	No	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
AB 1551 (Assembly Committee on Utilities and Commerce) CA Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority.	Amends the Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority Act to authorize the purchase or make loans for the purchase of alternative source energy or projects for sale to a specified participating party by entering into various specified instruments, including prepayment purchase contracts. Specifies that this authorization is only for contracts for energy derived from an alternative source.	Yes	Pending referral to Assembly committee.
SB 7 (Wiggins) Renewable Energy Sources: Net Metering.	Requires an electric distribution utility or cooperative, at the discretion of an eligible customer-generator, to take specified action in relation to net surplus electricity produced. Provides that only part or all of the electricity needed by a consumer is eligible for monetary incentives under solar initiative programs.	Yes	Senate Committee on Energy, Utilities and Communications.

SB 12 (Simitian) Clean Drinking Water and Water Supply Security Act of 2009.	Enacts the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta, Clean Drinking Water, Water Supply Security, and Environmental Improvement Act of 2009. Establishes a related council to prepare and adopt a Delta Ecosystem and Water Plan to advance the goals of restoring the Delta ecosystem and creating a more reliable water supply in the state. Authorizes the council to impose a water diversion fee and establishes a Delta Conservancy to implement the ecosystem restoration elements of the plan.	Yes	Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Water. Last amended 2/26/09.
SB 14 (Simitian) CA Public Utilities Commission: Renewable Energy Resources: Rates.	Requires the state and utilities to procure 33% of its energy from clean, environmentally friendly renewable energy resources by 2020, replacing the current mandate of 20% by 2010. Clarifies that utilities are not obligated to procure renewable resources beyond their retail electricity needs, and that utilities may voluntarily exceed the 33% mandate. SB 17 (Padilla) Electricity: Smart Grid Systems.	Requires the Public Utilities Commission to determine the requirements for a smart grid deployment plan consistent with the policies set forth in federal law. Requires each electrical corporation to develop and submit a smart grid deployment plan to the PUC.	Yes	Senate Committee on Energy, Utilities and Communications.
SB 22 (Simitian) Hazardous Materials: Toxic Substances.	Requires the Department of Toxic Substances Control to establish a Toxic Information Clearinghouse for the collection, maintenance and distribution of specific chemical hazard trait and environmental and toxicological end points and any other relevant data. Authorizes the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment to recommend procedures for expediting the review and identification of hazard traits to limit hazardous materials in products. SB 25 (Padilla) Solid Waste: Diversion.	Requires the CA Integrated Waste Management Board to develop a strategic and comprehensive plan to achieve a diversion rate of solid waste statewide from landfill disposal transformation.	Yes	Senate Committee on Environmental Quality.
SB 26 (Simitian) Home-Generated Pharmaceutical Waste.	Requires the State Board of Pharmacy to coordinate with other state agencies, local governments, drug manufacturers, and pharmacies to develop sustainable, efficient policies and programs to manage the disposal of unwanted or expired pharmaceutical drugs and devices. Authorizes pharmacies to accept the return of home-generated pharmaceutical waste.	Yes	Senate Committees on Business, Professions and Economic Development, and Environmental Quality. SUPPORT.
SB 31 (Pavley) CA Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006.	Requires that revenues collected pursuant to compliance mechanisms adopted by the State Air Resources Board be deposited in the Air Pollution Control Fund and specifies certain uses of the revenues. SB 32 (Negrete McLeod) Renewable Electric Generation Facilities.	Requires an electrical corporation to file a standard tariff with the Public Utilities Commission for the electricity purchased from an electric generation facility that is owned, leased or rented by a retail customer of the corporation. Requires the facility to be strategically located and interconnected to the electric grid. Requires that the tariff provide for a base payment rate utilizing a specified formula. SB 55 (Corbett) Recycling: Redemption Value Containers. SB 176 (Simitian) Electricity: Charges: Charitable Organizations.	Deletes the repeal date of the law authorizing a nonprofit charitable organization to acquire electric commodity service through a direct transaction with an electric service provider, if the electric commodity service is donated free of charge without compensation.
